## Appointment of FIA Board of Trustees

#### **RAKIRAKI WIN FIRST INTER-DISTRICT TOURNAMENT IN WELLINGTON**

Soccer fans in Wellington were treated to a dazzling display of skills and stamina at the first-ever Inter-district soccer tournament in Wellington. The tournament, organised by the Fiji Football Association, of Wellington featured eight teams: Suva, Ba, Navua, Rakiraki, Lautoka, Nadroga, Nadi and Tailevu. The inaugural IDC trophy, donated by former FIA President, Prabodh Mishra, in memory of his parents was won by Rakiraki, after a scintillating display of football against Tailevu. Rakiraki won after a penalty shoot-out. Tailevu, won the runner-up trophy, donated by the Suva team, in memory of their stalwart supporter, the late Mr Afzal Ali of Johnsonville. Suva was judged the best-disciplined side. The Lautoka team, fielded by Palmerston North were judged the best-dressed team by Prabodh Mishra and won the trophy for that category, donated by Nadroga team leader, Sanjesh Lallu in memory of his grandparents, Aja and Aji. FFAW Chairman, Salim Singh said a bigger tournament is planned for next year and expressed joy at the discipline and clean play that was a feature of the first-ever IDC tournament in Wellington. ## IMMIGRATION

Under the new Immigration Act 2003, former Fiji Citizens are NOT entitled but they may enter and reside in Fiji as provided for under Section 16 of the Constitution. As such they are “**exempted**” from having to obtain a permit to do so but the issue of exemption is subject to certain requirements and essentially those are:

1. A letter of request from applicants
2. Documentary evidence of Fiji Passport previously issued
3. Documentary evidence of Fiji Citizenship either **registration** or **naturalisation** certificate
4. Certified copy of applicant's current national passport
5. Police report from either country of citizenship or country of residence where the applicant has lived for twelve [12] months or more
6. Medical Report conducted within three months or less from the date of application
7. Fiji Birth Certificate

As for # 7 above, all those that were born in Fiji up to 6<sup>th</sup> October 1987 became Fiji Citizens on birth but for those that were born in Fiji after 6<sup>th</sup> October 1987; they must show proof that their parents were Fiji Citizens at the time of birth. Under the new Act, those born in Fiji and now holding foreign passports must show proof that their parents were Fiji Citizens on their birth.

Also, under the new Immigration Act those that were born in Fiji no longer enjoy the privilege that was provided for under the previous Act. **The Fiji Government has just announced that it will allow dual citizenship for former Fiji citizens. Details can be obtained from the Fiji High Commission and we will try to post the details on our website in the near future.**

### ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Environmental sustainability is a concern across the globe and as a community we can do our bit. There are many ways in which we can contribute towards Environmental Sustainability – so why not start now!

Here are some tips for you!

- Start recycling wastes.

- It is our sad duty to report the death of Al-Haj Shan Ali, a leading member of the Fiji Indian community in Wellington. Mr Ali, a highly respected person was laid to rest at the Islamic berm at the Whenua Tapu Cemetery. Members of the community, of all faiths congregated at Whenua Tapu, to bid farewell to Mr Shan Ali. Mr Ali was a very powerful advocate of the Fiji Indian Association and was recently appointed a member of the FIA's three-person Board of Trustees. Originally, from Wailailai in Ba, Mr Ali worked with various Government Departments and was seconded from the Education Ministry as Organizing Commissioner for the Fiji Scouts Movement. He was a former President of the International Muslim Association of New Zealand and at the time of his death, was still active in community work as Secretary of the Porirua Islamic Centre. He is survived by his wife, Al-Hajin Rahimun Ali, three sons, a daughter and several grandchildren. We wish to express our deep sorrow to his family and trust God will grant them strength and patience.
- It is also our sad duty to report the passing away of Mrs Sumintra Sahay Prasad, of Titahi Bay, mother of Naren Sahay and mother in law of Mrs Meena Sahay. Mrs Prasad hailed from Nadari, Ba and had a keen interest in music, a trait, which has been inherited by her eldest son, Naren, who contributed so richly to the musical side of the first-ever Girit commemoration in Wellington, which was organised in May this year by the Fiji Indian Association. She was cremated at the Whenua Tapu Crematorium. Mrs Prasad is very fondly remembered by her family and friends, who spoke very highly of her generosity, sense of humour and commitment to her family. You will all recall that earlier this year, Naren also lost his father, Mr Dharam Prasad Sahay. We pray for the family, in their time of grief.
- And..... in another loss, family and friends gathered at the Whenua Tapu Cemetery recently for the funeral of the late Mr Anwar Ali, a well-known Nausori identity, who had moved to Wellington, a few years ago. Mr Ali worked at the then Morris Hedstrom supermarket at Nausori for many years and died at home in Whitby. Mr Ali was the elder brother of well-known Cannons Creek businessman, Mahmood Ali and was a close relative of the Saiyad Ali family in Nausori, who ran a taxi business from Nausori Airport. The FIA expresses its deepest condolences to the family of the late Anwar Ali.
